SWORN STATEMENT OF PARTY CLAIMING EXEMPTION FROM THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE STATE OF ALABAMA LICENSING BOARD FOR GENERAL CONTRACTORS LICENSURE LAW ALA. CODE§ 34-8-1 (1975), et seq.

This form is required by the Baldwin County Building Department during the permit application process for any non-residential construction with a job valuation of \$50,000 or more or for construction of any swimming pool (residential or non-residential) with a job valuation of \$5,000 or more when the party responsible for construction is the property owner who does not hold an active "General Contractor" license with the Alabama Licensing Board for General Contractors.

I do hereby solemnly swear that I am exempt from the requirements of the <u>Alabama Licensing Board for General Contractors Licensure Law</u> because I am a person, firm, or corporation constructing a building or other improvements on his, her, or its own property provided that any of the work contracted out complies with the definition for general contractor in <u>Title 34</u>, <u>Chapter 8 of the Code of Alabama (1975)</u>. I further attest that all construction of a building, swimming pool, or other improvement on my own real property will be performed by one of the following:

- My own forces (non-contractual)
- Any subcontractor whose contract is less than \$50,000 (less than \$5,000 for a swimming pool) with a current State of Alabama Business License
- Any subcontractor whose contract is \$50,000 or more (\$5,000 or more for a swimming pool) with a current State of Alabama Business License and an active General Contractor license issued by the Alabama Licensing Board for General Contractors
